Objectives

- To be familiar with and acquire the methodological tools needed to conduct research into the right to education
- Knowing how to use research to build a solid case for advocacy
- Developing a network of experts on the right to education

Skills and competencies

By the end of the programme, participants will be able to:

- identify relevant topics and research questions (following a literature review);
- develop a methodology to address this issue;
- collect and analyse existing or original data;
- use the results of research for advocacy.

Teaching methods

- 100% distance teaching and learning activities
- Synchronous and asynchronous activities
- Active involvement of students throughout the modules
- Distance learning platform promoting collaborative working and flexible organisation of personal work

Structure

The entirely distance learning programme is organised into four thematic modules. The course corresponds to 120 hours of training: 16 hours in two-hour shifts on Fridays in group / synchronous sessions with guest speakers; 104 hours in individual / asynchronous sessions with the support of tutors.

- Module 1 | **Identifying relevant topics and research questions on the right to education**

- Module 2 | **Methodology design and data collection**
April 2025
- Module 3 | **Data analysis**
June 2025
- Module 4 | **Valuing research for advocacy**
August 2025

Assessment

Active participation in face-to-face teaching activities is required, as well as participation in collaborative activities.

Throughout the modules, participants will be required to develop a research project in the field of the right to education, from identifying a problem to disseminating the research. The research development will be assessed after each module to verify the acquisition of skills.

Validation

At the end of the course, participants receive a certificate of attendance together with a document detailing all the skills acquired.
